Profiles in Encouragement: Interview with Tony Marini

Tony Marini, along with Joe Maciejowski, is co-founder of the Massachusetts Accordion Association (MAAA). This month's profile begins with a note of appreciation for Tony's father, a lifelong accordionist who passed away just over 30 years ago. Tony played the accordion a bit in his childhood but returned seriously about 7 years ago. A friend, Ron Mastrangelo (also a member of MAAA) told him about the well-known teacher Paul Monte, our featured member in last month's column. Tony began lessons and his current journey with the accordion was underway.

One pivotal experience occurred last summer, when Tony attended the accordion convention in Las Vegas. He met many people who were active in accordion clubs in their own states, and said to himself, "We should have a group in Massachusetts!" This tells you much about Tony: he arrived home and immediately began networking, met Joe Maciejowski (you'll meet him in next month's column), and soon the two of them had MAAA up and running!

couragement or frustration with his accordion playing, Tony said that the best step is to talk with someone who is trusted and believable. He has learned to be realistic about his own strengths and weaknesses as a musician. Working hard, practicing effectively, these are what he sees as keys to success.

Tony underlined that for him, accordion playing is a hobby that should be enjoyed as such. His father was a great entertainer when he strapped on his accordion and sang with his wonderful voice. In that vein, Tony notes that the great professional accordion player Peter Soave talks about making his accordion" sing". Whether listening or playing, Tony tries to take in each note with pleasure, as one would drink a good wine. Just watch Tony smile when he introduces performers at our meetings, or watch him applaud, and you will see that his appreciation for accordion music is truly a gift.

Quote from Joe: "I truly am fond of this instrument since it can be used in so many applications, is portable, very musically diverse and can be traced back into assorted cultural roots."

This month, Joe strapped on his PANjet piano accordion. He began his performance by noting that most popular music familiar to Americans is in 3/4and 4/4 time. He tapped out and then played a piece in 5/8 time: "Everything's Alright" from the 1970's musical "Jesus Christ Superstar". Another piece from this musical, "I Don't Know How to Love Him" gave some of us a chance to hum a familiar tune. And the "Zackopani Jump" featured some of the ethnic and strongly rhythmic music that Joe clearly loves.

Joe closed his set with a staggering rendition of Pietro Frosini's piece "Tailspin", played originally by Frosini on a three row chromatic accordion. The blinding movement of the right hand in this piece led Joe to joke that he would not have time to scratch his nose during the piece. Joe 's virtuosity left all of us simply scratching our heads in disbelief!
