


All you really need is some desire to learn and a commitment to yourself of a minimum of an hour per day to practice. A good teacher is the best springboard to quality practice and an understanding of what the lessons are trying to accomplish. A good teacher will encourage and will challenge you to allow you to get the most out of your practice. After only a short time, you will be playing tunes that people know and you will be happy to hear them sing along...

There are also e-lessons on the internet and self-teach books at your local music store for you to download if you wish to teach yourself.....although you can do it, I personally recommend a teacher to at least get you started.

Well so much for these thoughts. Young or old, boy or girl, with a little time, practice and desire, you too can play the accordion and bring happiness to yourself and those around you.

Suggestion: Sit down with your accordion and experiment. Play a phrase or piece and listen to how you can change it by moving the bellows in different ways. Read through these ideas and then take it from there: How far with one motion? How fast? How much force? Smoothly, with undulation, or with dramatic changes in motion? Entire bellows in or out at once, or lower/upper moved differentially? When to change direction?

Instead of simply playing your accordion, treat it as a wonderful toy and play with the bellows in your practice sessions. Your performances will improve without your

learning a single new note—the pieces you already know will come to life, thanks to your accordion's bellows!
