Shannon Price coordinator for recreational music programs at West Music in Corralville, Iowa, tells us why music is a worthy investment in any economy

Get Lost in a Lesson

Taking music lessons is a financial commitment that you can consider an investment in your life. Even though your goal is not to become a professional musician, knowing how to play an instrument and taking it as far as you can makes you a more rounded person and that's something that can't be measured in financial terms. Research has shown, time and again, that music makes you healthier and helps you live longer.

Your 30- to 60-minute lesson is time just for you—so get lost in a lesson. Then, think of practice time as icing on the cake. Close the door and lose the outside world for a while.

If you are still uncertain about making the weekly financial commitment to music, consider other options. Some teachers are willing to take on beginner students at a lower than normal rate or will allow you to sign up for lessons twice a month instead of every week.

There is also the option of online lessons or DVDs. But it's not the same as having a live person who can see you, hear you, offer advice, and answer questions. Also, video lessons can't give you feedback on your technique.

Hopefully you all know AI. He is our club's secretary\treasurer and regularly seen at our meetings. On March 7-9, 2008, the American Accordion Musicological Society (AAMS) held its annual Festival in King of Prussia, PA. The event included concerts by renowned accordionists, workshop presentations by experts, and professionally adjudi-

cated competitions in a variety of categories. Al competed in two categories, Ethnic-Senior and, Festival Virtuoso, which is the elite category in the competition. He was rewarded for his thorough preparation by winning the first place award in both categories.

Al was kind enough to share some of his experiences with us. Next time you see Al just go up and say hi, he'll be glad to meet you.

1) when and how did you get started in playing the accordion

I was a kid in the fourth grade when I started lessons. I admired my cousin who took lessons, and I wanted to be like him. It turned out that he was not the best role model, but I always liked the accordion. I not only continued long after he stopped but in college I played in a dance band and made some significant money that helped me get through college.

2) what kind or type of music do you like playing the best

I like complex music that is difficult and challenging: classical, latin, and jazz. I have a growing interest in ethnic music but I don't have enough time to fit everything in.

3) how did you get over the fear of performing before an audience

I have never gotten over my fear of playing in front of an audience. I'm a little less nervous now than when I started at the club, but I'm still nervous in front of the group. When I play at the accordion club I usually make mistakes I've never made when practicing. However I am grateful for the opportunity to perform for a group that enjoys the instrument and tolerates the effort made by the performer even if the performance isn't perfect.

4) also, anything you would like to tell about yourself would be a great feature

Music has always been important to me. I enjoy live music by orchestras; soloists, particularly piano, violin, and accordion; and jazz groups at our local Java Room. Not only does music move me, but also as a player I really appreciate the difficulties of playing.

I would like to add the following: If someone wants to improve their accordion playing they need patience, practice, and persistance. Practice slowly until the notes are mastered. Pick up the speed gradually. Practice until the notes are in your fingers. Practice pieces in sections and work on each section separately. Before starting, read the music over, to understand the key, the dynamic changes, the tempo changes, the registration which must all be in the finished work. As you practice try to put all these pieces together so you don't have to keep correcting things later. Have fun getting to level you want to achieve. Don't be distracted if life gets in the way of your practice time. Just get back to practicing when you can. Al


