Here is a note I received from one of Lenny Feldman's newsletter recipients in response to an article Lenny posted. I thought it would give some insight as to how some

accordionists share their talents with others....

Bob. I was happy to receive Lenny Feldmann's link to "your story."

I appreciate the value of music as therapy. I'm currently giving some over-the-phone accordion help to a guy who suffers from C.O.P.D (lung disease) same as I, who was a tubist years ago, so now his therapist has him playing his sousaphone 15 minutes a day to develop more lung power.

About 50 years ago, I joined a volunteer group at the Pennsylvania State Hospital (mental) in Harrisburg. We played games with about 80 patients every week. Some of the volunteers knew I was an accordionist, and suggested that since a few of us were pretty good singers, they asked the administrator if we could tour some of the wards and sing Christmas Carols in December. When the doctor agreed, we asked about the wards we had never visited because the patients were catatonic and non-responsive (they sat and stared all day long). He agreed as long as we were accompanied by at least two nurses to observe any negative effects it might have on the patients.

Bob, two gals and a guy, backed up by yours truly strapped to a Pancordion moved though 15 wards (some small with 5 or 6 beds, and some large - 20-30 beds) singing Jingle Bells, Rudolph, Silent Night, White Christmas,

Frosty, O Holy Night, S.C. Is Coming To Town, et al. in nice harmony. We had been told not to expect those in what they called the "bad wards" to demonstrate any appreciation for our talent, and sure enough, I noticed only one man start to sing Jingle Bells (out of key) along with us.

The following week the entire volunteer group was called to a special meeting during which three nurses gave us detailed reports on 5 patients who had a "reaction" during our tour. As soon as we left her ward, one 50-year-old woman jumped up and danced and sang Santa Claus Is Coming To Town. She had been in a catatonic state of schizophrenia for four years, and now was being treated for recovery. The other 4 stories was similar. About a year later, we were told that a 59-year-old man who had been "under it" for 11 years, was being prepared for discharge. Absolutely amazing! I know how difficult it must have been for you to struggle with those narrow keys, but I see in the last picture in your message that you appear to be playing a Roland FR-7.

In my case, a 16.5 pound Roland FR-3s has made it possible for this 78-year-old guy to play again after 15 years (a back injury followed by a neck injury made it impossible for me to lift my 29 pound instrument, and my C.O.P.D. made if impossible to pump the bellows without exhaustion after a few minutes. Now I can again enjoy those minor 9ths and minor7flat5ths in beautiful jazz progressions (from Gershwin to Mancini).
