MAAA members attend 17th Semi-Annual Roland V-Accordion event

Several MAAA members attended the Roland V-Accordion Event put on by Sam Facetti and Falcetti Music on Sunday, May 2, 2015. I can't fail to mention Peggy Falcetti, Sam's wife who is seemingly related to the Energizer Bunny and is a big part of pulling off the event successfully.

Among the attendees were Carol and me, Tony DeEramo and his wife, Carmen D'Angelo, Coach Dave LaPrise and Ernestine, Al Bacchiocchi and Rosemary, Dave Sullivan, and Oliver Mutch and Jan Miller. Not that I needed it, if you know me, but Jan, as usual, baked an incredible

array of baked cookies and squares and they were, as always, eagerly received by the attendees.



The event started off with a workshop by Sam Falcetti who went over the ins and outs of transposing music, defining what it was and how it might be used. He covered both vertical transposition and horizontal transposition. Of course, being a Roland event, the availability of their transpose function was mentioned.

In addition, his handout covered instructions for using the on-board transposer of the various accordion models and a discussion of the circle of fifths, key of C, and how the Stradella system follows it, making transposition much easier.

husband, I believe, on what looked like a box made for simple drum beat accompaniment. I am not quite sure what it was called. Joseph decided to go with a Roland because

it provided adequate bass for the trio, unlike the acoustic. They were amazing, playing both a polka and more traditional fiddle music. This was a first and went over extremely well.



Next up was Sammy Gavish who mesmerized us with his mixture of Jewish, Arabic, and Russian music. This type of music is a little different from what we normally hear at Sam's and at the MAAA. Sam is an incredible player. If I understood correctly, Sam studied music in Israel and learned to play under the Solfeggio system. While I am not familiar with it, evidently that system doesn't use note letters like C, F, A but instead uses a system of do, re, mi, etc. I found that very

interesting indeed. I wonder if anyone in the MAAA either learned with it or knows about it. It would make a great article for this newsletter (see article at right for more about this!).

World champion accordionist Cory Pesaturo performs at MAAA April meeting

Cory Pesaturo dazzled us all at MAAA's April meeting. Whether you'd heard Cory before or this was a first exposure, it was like watching fireworks.

After greeting his "extended accordion family" of MAAA members and friends, Cory launched into performing with no pre-rehearsed



program. Instead, he invited the audience to call out musical genres or specific compositions, and responded to each request with a spectacular, spontaneous rendition.

Angela Falcetti called out the first request-for a polka. Cory began "Pennsylvania Polka" with what he labeled a "Lawrence Welk" intro. A gypsy jazz version of "After You've Gone" (requested by Tony Marini) came next, which Cory played in honor of Don McMahon--a

jazz accordionist and pioneer of the Roland digital accordion from Springfield, MA.

Of course we all wanted to hear a tango, and were treated to the passioante Libertango, the composition which in 1974 announced Piazzola's launching of Tango Nuevo. It was followed by "You Must Believe in Spring," a gorgeous ballad by one of Cory's favorite composers, Michel Legrand; "Green Dolphin Street" rendered by a chorus of Roland voices; and the Chopin Fantaisie-Impromptu ("Chopin works so well on the accordion, if you change a couple of things," he noted.)

It was an exciting afternoon of musicianship.

Brief bio

Cory Pesaturo grew up playing the accordion in Rhode Island and got his first break at the age of 11 when he filled in for a sick Myron Floren at the Warwick Musical Theater.

At the age of 12, Cory performed at the White House for President Clinton and on another occasion became the youngest person ever to perform at a State Dinner when he played with the Marine Strolling Strings for the President of Hungary. He graduated from the New England Conservatory of Music, where he was the first musician ever to major and graduate in the accordion.

Cory (aka C Pez) is a World Digital Accordion Champion (Coupe Mondiale), World Acoustic Accordion Champion (Primus Ikaalinen), and the only person to ever win Acoustic Accordion, Digital Accordion, and Jazz Accordion World Championships.

Cory builds on the accordion's glorious history and brings it into the future in order to revive its popularity. He made the first ever skinned accordion with a symmetric midi lighting system attached to the keys, and is developing his own electric accordion.
